We are in Westminster Abbey, the House of Kings, the place of Coronation. We are in Westminster Abbey at Christmas, to celebrate the birth of the King of kings. What company we keep.

Mary and Joseph arrive in Bethlehem in time for a birth, there are shepherds, angels, and there will be three more kings.

In this holy season, there are similar services taking place all over the United Kingdom, we share our celebration with them.

Tonight, across the world children, women, and men long for peace and we join our prayers with theirs.

The world around us, all our hopes and fears, our history, and our faith gather here, all of us hoping for what is still to come. What company we keep.

Here in the Abbey, we have heard the story of a baby, born on a dark night when you could see the stars. A family is far from home, near a city full of soldiers, barely welcome, and finding what shelter they could. Against the odds, and with the support of others, a mother will keep her child safe.
